Property Crime, like burglary and thefts, generally increases between June and September each year.1

Proactively Addressing Summer Challenges

Understanding the factors contributing to the seasonal surge in crime is crucial for law enforcement agencies to deploy effective preventative measures.





Increased Social Interaction in Public Spaces:

The warmth of summer draws individuals and families outdoors for festivals, block parties, and gatherings. While these events foster bonding, they also increase the chances of disputes and altercations. Large crowds provide more opportunities for theft and other crimes, particularly when alcohol consumption is involved.

Numerous studies indicate a strong link between rising temperatures and increased aggression. Psychologists point to the physiological effects of heat, including elevated body temperature, heart rate, and blood pressure,

which can exacerbate irritability and lead to violent outbursts.

The Role of Heat and Aggression:

When schools close for summer vacation, many youths find themselves unsupervised with abundant free time. This increased level of idle time sometimes correlates with higher rates of juvenile delinquency and property crimes, such as vandalism and theft.



Holidays, particularly the Fourth of July, are linked to spikes in violent crimes. Historically, July 4th has been one of the most violent days of the year, with elevated rates of shootings and other acts of violence. The mix of large gatherings, alcohol, and celebratory gunfire exacerbates the situation.



Increased Opportunities for Property Crimes: Longer daylight hours during summer months, coupled with families taking extended vacations, create ideal

conditions for burglary. Homes left empty for prolonged periods and communities with heavy foot traffic often experience spikes in property-related crimes.




